Community Development (CD) Queensland hosts a conversation on community development and end of life, with a focus on both the broader topic of palliative care, CD and bereavement, including a story of the work of Queensland-based Hummingbird House (a unique hospice working with children with life-limiting illness and facing end of life).

This seminar will provide an opportunity to think about how the 'community turn' (a return of end of life concerns to community, not just professionals) and palliative care can be shaped by CD theory and practice. Come along if it's relevant to your personal life, professional work, or if you could imagine how your community-based work might be helpful for people at end-of life.

The format will include 45 mins of input (zoom-panel), Q&A discussion and then 30 mins of on-line social/drinks (yes, have a drink nearby). It will be hosted by CD worker at Hummingbird House, Peter Westoby, and the panel consists of:

Andrea Grindrod is a Research Fellow and the Projects Manager at the Public Health Palliative Care Unit, La Trobe University. She is the developer of the Healthy End of Life Project (HELP), a health promotion and community development framework for end of life care. Her post PhD recovery hobbies includes backyard permaculture - frog habitats, edible gardening and her latest additions to the team, Thelma and Louise (chickens).

Shyla Mills is the CEO of Palliative Care Queensland, which has a community element called Queensland Compassionate Communities. She is a registered nurse with a Master of Palliative Care and Public Health and has worked in paediatrics, adults and aged care throughout Australia. She has a special interest in public health palliative care, community awareness and building compassionate communities. Shyla has two sons in primary school, a husband who is a palliative care nurse academic and a dog. She says that her Ambulance Wish would be to watch a sunset at the beach with her family, dog and a glass of red wine.

Elham Day is the Family and Community Support Manager at Hummingbird House, Queensland's only Children's Hospice, where he has co-led the development of participatory approaches to family-led end of life, and after death care since the hospice opened in 2016. With a diverse background across disability, education, arts, youth, family & therapeutic work, when Elham is not at HH, he is usually found strolling in the bush with his family, or hanging out in dimly lit venues with live music loud enough to mandate earplugs.

Paul Toon, Community Development Worker at Hummingbird House, comes to this landscape of practice via a vocational journey with travels in Special Education, Community Development and Educational Leadership and Counselling. His love and passion for practice across these has been about justice, human dignity and fulfillment. His love and engagement with the natural environment through such delights as multiday bushwalks has him reflecting more often about Nature Based Therapy for himself and others.
