The Queensland Community Development Conference has been held biennially since 1974 in different regional locations across Queensland. These aims begin when ordinary people commit to dialogue and solidarity building – through discussions at home, in their workplaces, with their neighbours, in their community groups and organisations. Driven by Community Development (CD) QLD and hosted by regional partners, the aim of the conference is to inspire, celebrate and develop a shared approach to citizen-led community development. CD is a field of practice that supports community members or citizens to bring about

## Neighbourhood Centres Queensland (ncq.org.au)

Neighbourhood Centres have had a long tradition of meeting together at the Queensland Community Development Conference since their beginnings in the 1970's.

After officially forming the Community Centres and Family Support Network Association of Queensland (CCFSNAQ) in 1997, the sector held their state meeting in the days prior to the Qld Community Development Conference. This state meeting was comprised of representatives of Neighbourhood Centre regional networks from across the state to talk about issues of importance to them and plan collective action.

Now known as Neighbourhood Centres Qld (NCQ), the peak body continues to work in partnership with the Queensland Community Development Conference to bring Neighbourhood and Community Centres from around the state together at their Statewide Neighbourhood Centre gathering and foster a Neighbourhood Centre stream at the conference. The conference is a great opportunity for Neighbourhood Centres to come together and develop their place-based community-led expertise with others for the benefit of local communities in rural, regional, remote and urban areas.

### les Halliwell Address

### 25 Years of the 'Building Better Communities' Course — Developing the Craft of Community Building

A panel presentation led by Howard Buckley

– Community Praxis Co-op

In 1999, in the Caboolture Shire, a rapidly growing region north of Brisbane, a local councillor was grappling with the population growth in her area and asked the question 'how do we build community not just suburbs?'. This led to a course being developed by Community Praxis Co-op to bring residents together to explore how they could build community in their new suburbs. It was called the "Building Better Communities" training course.

The popularity of the course grew across Moreton Bay, Brisbane City and the Sunshine Coast and has now been delivered in many parts of Queensland. Howard Buckley has been involved in delivering many courses and through his rich 28 year history of community work in Moreton Bay tells the story of the craft behind the course.

Howard will present some key processes and content that the course has been built around. A key foundational principle that is established in each course is the notion



that "we cannot build community but we can create the space where community is built". The address will use observations from course participants revealed though formal and non-formal evaluation processes.

A panel consisting of five previous participants will share their perspectives of what the course has meant to them and their communities. One panel member, Jody will speak from her role as a community organisation host agency and the others from their perspectives as participants in three very different courses: Rebecca from Deception Bay; Feather from Pomona, and Narlah and Liam as High School students in Baringa.

The Address weaves the stories from participants and the processes and content of the Building Better Communities course. It will build a compelling case for more experimentation with community building as a craft we embody, not just a technical skill we learn, and the challenge to take this experiment outside of our realm of comfort.


